

Advance Publicity **Cornish Trio Rally 7th to 17th May 2015**



Looe

On the south east coast of Cornwall, Looe is a small coastal town and fishing port. The town is situated around a small harbour and along the steep-sided valley of the River Looe, which flows between East and West Looe to the sea beside a sandy beach. The campsite is on the outskirts of the town with very good access to the Coastal Path. It is an easy walk down into the town but a bit of a climb back up the hill! There is an excellent bus service running just a few hundred yards from the site entrance if you do not fancy the puff up hill.

The bus service runs east to Looe and west to Polperro and then on to Polruan (where you can catch the ferry to Fowey).

The campsite has very modern washrooms and there is a good indoor swimming pool.

North of Redruth.

Once the very heart of the Cornish Mining Industry and now a UNESCO World Heritage site, this area of south west Cornwall is full of interest. The campsite is close to one of the Mineral Tramways, which has now become a cycleway/footpath. The coastal path can be reached from this Tramway.

From the top of Carn Brea, one of the hills believed to have been significant in prehistory, you can see sea on either side of the Cornish peninsula. There are breathtaking views of the coast from St Ives to Perranporth and inland across the wild hills of West Cornwall.

A short distance from the campsite there are buses to Redruth, Camborne, and St Ives; and in the other direction, Truro.

Truro is a bustling Cathedral City known for its cobbled streets and Georgian Architecture. From its quay there is a boat link to Falmouth along the Rivers Truro and Fal, which runs four times a day.

Wadebridge

The town of Wadebridge in North Cornwall, straddles the River Camel 5 miles upstream from Padstow. Originally known as Wade, it was a dangerous fording point until a bridge was built in the 15th century, after which its name was changed to Wadebridge. It was connected to the railway system between 1834 and 1960: the line now forms the Camel Trail, a recreational route for walkers and cyclists.

The campsite is a short distance from the Camel Trail. Padstow is but 5 miles along the trail and in the other direction the Trail goes to Bodmin.

The local bus service also goes to Padstow and another service goes to the old fishing village of Port Issac (of Fishermans Friends fame).

In Summary

This is a three centre rally which has been planned in a most beautiful part of Britain.

Three quite contrasting areas of Cornwall will be visited, each with their own appeal.

Site fees will be set at £15 per night per unit and 2 adults, inc electricity.
